# **INTRODUCTION**

The Kofi Annan International Peacekeeping Training Centre (KAIPTC) in 2013 celebrated a decade of building regional capacity for conflict, peace and security through research, training and education. The Centre has made notable strides since it started running courses in 2003 and has over the years gained an international reputation and recognition in its field. Among other significant achievements, the Centre has, between 2003 and 2013:

- 1. Built the capacity of over 11,000 military, police and civilian personnel working in multidimensional peace support operations. KAIPTC Alumni are impacting the work of ECOWAS, African Union / United Nations missions globally;
- 2. Contributed to the management of contemporary and emerging peace and security challenges from an intellectual and practical perspective as a result of the introduction of two post-graduate programmes: Master of Arts in Conflict, Peace and Security (MCPS) and the Master of Arts in Gender, Peace and Security (MGPS);
- 3. Established a strong and vibrant research unit whose work informs the development of training and academic programmes and regional policy on security-related issues;
- 4 Deepened strategic and operational collaboration with various stakeholders national, regional and international in the pursuit of peace and security; and
- 5. Emerged as one of the preferred hubs for international conferences and meetings on conflict, peace and security.

These achievements contributed to the Centre's ranking as 60<sup>th</sup> among the top 70 Security and International Affairs Think Tanks in 2012 and 51<sup>st</sup> among the 65 top global Foreign Policy and International Affairs Think Tanks in 2013. The KAIPTC also won the 2012 West Africa Peace Ambassadors Award in recognition of its contribution to peace and security in West Africa.

After ten years of operation, the Centre projects to enhance its responsiveness to new and emerging trends in peace and security in Africa and the world.

The focus of the Centre over the next five years is outlined in its new Strategic Plan (2014–2018) and will be based on the following strategic objectives:

- 1. To enhance the capacity of ECOWAS, AU, UN and other relevant actors in multidimensional peacekeeping and peace-building (integrated peace support operations) through training;
- 2. To deepen understanding of and discourses on critical peace and security issues in Africa through research and policy engagements;
- 3. To contribute to knowledge creation that informs best practice in conflict prevention, management and resolution in Africa; and
- 4. To ensure an efficient, effective and responsive governance and management system in the Centre.

- 1. Focus on the core mandate of training in peacekeeping and Peace Support Operations (PSO).
- 2. Ensure sustainability of the academic programmes.

- 4. Ensure financial sustainability of the Centre.
- 5. Ensure decentralise results based Management procedures.







### DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

#### A: OFFICE OF THE COMMANDANT

Following the development of a new Strategic Plan towards the end of 2013, the Office of the Commandant (OOC) is currently made up of the Secretariat of the Commandant and the Deputy Commandant, the Chief Instructor, the Office of the Chief Coordinator, the Women Peace and Security Institute, the Library, Internal Audit and the Department of Policy, Plans, Monitoring & Evaluation comprising the Legal, Corporate Affairs and Monitoring and Evaluation Units.

During the year under review, the OOC consolidated its mandate by leading in liaison and networking efforts with partners and stakeholders, consolidating strategic engagements, ensuring the provision of comprehensive access to information resources, effective and efficient governance, accountability and transparency in the management of and reporting on the use of the Centre's resources and efficiency in the coordination of the planning, programming monitoring and evaluation of the Centre's operations. The Office through the Women Peace and Security Institute (WPSI), also continued its efforts of supporting the implementation of United Nations Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) 1325 by focusing on gender specific initiatives and ensuring effective mainstreaming of gender in the Centre's operations.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF 2013 ACTIVITIES

The following were major activities undertaken in 2013.

#### a. Commemoration of 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The Centre launched the commemoration of the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary on 20 February 2013. The following activities formed part of the year long celebrations.

#### i. The Kofi Annan-Dag Hammarskjöld Annual Lecture

This was an inaugural lecture instituted in honour of two former Secretary-Generals of the United Nations and was used to discuss thematic issues in conflict, peace and security. The inaugural lecture provided the platform for engaging with other partners, increased the visibility

of the activities of the Centre and has strengthened the relationship between the KAIPTC and the Dag Hammarskjöld Foundation. The lecture was delivered by Ambassador Ellen Margrethe Loj, a former Special Representative of the Secretary-General (SRSG), United Nations Mission In Liberia (UNMIL). It was chaired by Dr Mohammed Ibn Chambas, the Joint AU/UN Representative for Darfur. Hon Mark Woyongo, Ghana's Minister of Defence and Chair of the KAIPTC Governing Board launched the commencement of activities marking the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations of KAIPTC.

# ii. Association For Security Sector Reform Education and Training (ASSET) Annual General Meeting (AGM)

The Association for Security Sector Reform Education and Training (ASSET) is one of the international associations of which the Centre is a member. In line with the Centre's commitment and responsibility to this association, the Centre successfully hosted the Association's 5<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting (AGM). The AGM was organized by the Centre in collaboration with the African Security Sector Network (ASSN) and the Geneva Centre for Democratic Control of Armed Forces (DCAF). The meeting was held under the theme "Supporting the Implementation of Security Sector Reform Strategies within Regional and Sub-regional organizations". The AGM discussed support for the development and delivery of high-quality security reform training and teaching materials in order to meet the increasing demand for qualified Security Sector Reform (SSR) practitioners, policy makers and trainers.

#### iii. Women's Day Celebration

This event was organized to highlight the achievements of women in the areas of political, economic and social developments. The event enhanced the image of the Centre and increased understanding of its activities as it showcased what the Centre is doing in the area of women peace and security. The Women's Day was attended by the Minister of Gender, Children and Social Protection, Ghana, a representative of the UNDP Resident Coordinator, women's organizations and heads of security services. The programme included a panel discussion and photo exhibition.

#### iv. Partners' Forum

The KAIPTC institutionalised a Partners Forum aimed at providing a platform for both the Centre and its Partners to discuss issues of mutual interest at a technical level. This forum seeks to enhance and optimize the relationship between the KAIPTC and its Partners. The maiden meeting sought inputs into the first draft of the Centre's new Strategic Plan 2014 – 2018.

#### v. Staff Teambuilding Activities

As part of the Centre's Health and well being programme managed by the Human Resource Unit, the KAIPTC organized a seven kilometre walk foster team spirit among staff of KAIPTC.

The Centre also organized a sea trip and a cooking competition as part of the anniversary celebrations. This promoted better relationships between civilian and military staff and provided the opportunity for staff to showcase their culinary skills. Four teams representing each department at the Centre took part in the cooking competition. The team from the Department of Administration emerged winners of the competition.

#### vi. Thanksgiving Service

To crown the year long 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the Centre organised a thanksgiving service on the theme "Give Thanks to God in All Things". The service was officiated by Wg Cdre Temadonku, Senior Chaplain of the Military Academy and Training School (MATS) and Haruna Ocloo, MATS Imam.

#### b. Institutional Development

To reflect changing and emerging trends in conflict, peace and security as well as to take advantage of opportunities for growth, expansion and efficiency, the KAIPTC initiated strategies for developing and sustaining the Centre. In this regard, the Centre embarked on the development of the following:

#### i. Strategic Plan 2014 – 2018

The Centre through an extensive stakeholder consultation process developed its new strategic plan to better articulate the its priorities, vision and mission for the next four years. The Strategic plan, developed with support from the German Agency for International Cooperation (GIZ), had inputs from both internal and external stakeholders and was approved by the Governing Board on 10 December 2013.

#### ii. Environmental Assessment

The KAIPTC with support from GIZ commissioned a survey to assess its work in the last decade in the field of PSO with a view to improve its services. The initial report from the assessment provided key lessons and insights on how the Centre has been performing within that field. The report further provided recommendations on how the Centre could further engage with the AU Commission and ECOWAS Commission.

#### iii. Communication and Marketing Strategy

The Centre contracted a consultant to;

- Assist in assessing its current communication needs, focusing on existing communication orientation, priorities, activities capacities and structures;
- Provide a comprehensive overview of its current communication activities; and
- Identify strengths, weaknesses, challenges and opportunities.

This process is still in progress and expected to end in the first quarter of 2014.

#### c. Annual Planning, Monitoring & Evaluation

The Centre coordinated the development of the 2014 results based centre-wide work plans. This has led to an improved budgeting process. In the area of monitoring and evaluation (M&E), the Centre continued to strengthen its M&E system through periodic M&E reporting sessions. These sessions provided a forum for M&E focal persons to report on results-based planned inputs put in place to attain desired goals. The year 2013 also saw:

- The recruitment of a substantive Head of the Monitoring and Evaluation Unit,
- The running of three capacity building trainings for M&E focal persons across the Centre,
- Three monitoring visits to the Gambia, Mali and Guinea. These visits were aimed at assessing and the impact of KAIPTC courses.

#### d. Engagement With Stakeholders

The Centre undertook the following engagement activities with its Partners.

#### i. Governing Board Meetings

In spite of the change in leadership at the KAIPTC and the Ministry of Defence (MOD), the Centre successfully organized two Governing Board Meetings in the year. The continuous organization of these meetings increased the confidence of partners in the Centre.

#### ii. New Partnership Agreements

During the period under review, the Centre built and strengthened its relationship with national, regional and international institutions and development partners through the formalization of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) / Cooperation and Letters of Agreements among others. Twenty two (22) MoUs and other agreements have been signed. Details are attached as Annex 3.

#### iii. Resource Mobilization

During the year under review, the Centre secured an additional four years of core funding from the governments of Sweden and Denmark.

#### iv. Programme Review

In line with modalities for Danish support to the Centre, the Embassy of Denmark, in Addis Ababa, commissioned a review of the Danish support to the KAIPTC. The review assessed the Centre's commitment to its vision and mission statements and determined best options for Denmark's continued support to the Centre. The review provided the Centre with key learning points to help ensure its sustainability.

#### v. Key Visits

Relationships with partner institutions, development partners, regional organizations and individuals were strengthened through visits to the Centre. These visits continue to showcase the Centre to stakeholders and contribute to the enhancement of knowledge on the work of the Centre and its contribution to regional peace and security. A detailed list of such visits is attached as Annex 4.

#### e. Strategic Collaboration

In 2013, the Centre undertook a number of strategic collaborations including:

i. The Launch of the West African Commission on the impact of Drugs on Governance, Security and Development (WACD)

The KAIPTC provided support to the Kofi Annan Foundation during the launch of the West Africa Commission on the impact of Drugs on Governance, Security and Development (WACD). The Commission was formed in response to the dramatic surge in drug trafficking in West Africa over the last decade.

#### ii. Rule of Law, Governance and Conflict Prevention Course

The KAIPTC in collaboration with the UNDP Togo organized a training course on Rule of Law, Governance and Conflict Prevention in the Republic of Togo. This was part of an agreement between the Centre and UNDP Togo. The course which had participants from Non Governmental Organizations(NGOs), Togolese ministries, human rights institutions and national security agencies built capacity for regional participants and increased the visibility of the Centre in the provision of training in PSO.

#### iii. Review and Development of APSTA Strategic Plan

The Centre in collaboration with the African Peace Support Trainers Association (APSTA) organized a workshop for the members aimed at reviewing the association's strategic plan. The Centre provided financial and technical support for that review and for the development of a new strategic plan for APSTA.

#### f. Internal Control

The Centre through its internal audit system continued to manage risks related to its operations during the period under review. To this end, it carried out a number of audits across selected units and departments to ensure accuracy, timeliness and reliability of technical/financial reports and effectiveness and efficiency of implementation of work plans by units. This led to the reduction of risk.

#### g. Library

The Library continued to provide comprehensive access to information resources particularly to the Centre's training and academic programmes. Between January and December 2013, book stock increased from 1,183 to 2,623. Additionally, the Library has a total of 100 journal titles and 793 reports, magazines, policy briefs and course materials. Electronic databases available to the patrons have also increased from 20 to 29 as at the end of 2013. The United States Army Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute (PKSOI) gave KAIPTC patrons free access to its educative online database: SOLLIMS.

The Library has also set up the EZ-PROXY software which enables patrons to access all the online databases outside the Centre without using passwords and usernames. So far, 100 patrons have registered to access the electronic resources. Bibliographic records in the web-based Online Public Access Catalogue, (OPAC) have also increased from 119 to 764 as at the end of 2013. The number patrons who visited the Library and used its services and resources increased from 2,466 to 9,420 in 2013.

#### **B: TRAINING DEPARTMENT**

The Training Department continued to deliver within the broader strategic mandate of the Centre as an ECOWAS Training Centre of Excellence. The courses conducted by the department are divided into individual and collective training programmes. The collective Training Programme concentrates on pre-deployment training of Ghanaian troops. This aspect of the Centre's training is conducted by a Force Training Team at Bundase for the Army and in Takoradi for the Air Force.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF 2013 ACTIVITIES

#### a. Individual Training

In 2013, the Centre continued to build capacity for regional actors in global multi-dimensional PSO's. The capacity building activities for military, police and civilian personnel led to the organisation of 42 Individual Training courses. In all 1,442 participants were trained and this exceeded the 1,020 participants trained in 2012 within the same stipulated period. The Sahel Project, sponsored by the Government of Japan and aimed at enhancing the capacity of operational level practitioners to handle peace and security issues in Mali, Nigeria, Niger, Burkina Faso and Senegal, resulted in the increased numbers in 2013. The subsequent tables and charts provide the details of courses depicting the gender component and regional backgrounds of participants.







#### Chart 2. Representation by Component





The KAIPTC has plans to adapt some of the POTI courses to the West African context and the courses to be adapted are under review by a select team of subject matter experts from the Centre. The adaptation and review process is set to span over a period of 6 months (January to June 2014). The following are the recommended POTI Courses to be adapted:

- i. Gender Perspectives;
- ii. Implementation of Security Council Resolution 1325 (2000) in Africa;
- iii. Protection of Civilians;
- iv. Disarmament, Demobilization and Reintegration (DDR);
- v. United Nations Civil-Military Coordination (UN-CIMIC); and
- vi. Peacekeeping and International Conflict Resolution.

#### c. Learning Management System (LMS) Project

Two consultants were contracted by GIZ in 2013 to investigate the exact need and the conditions for introducing a Learning Management System (LMS) to address an overall integrated management system for online Database, Alumni Portal and E-Learning. A meeting held in September 2013 discussed the findings and recommendations of the consultants and the way-forward. Subsequently, a three day working group was held in December 2013 to finalize the requirements for the smooth take-off of the LMS project. The project, set to span over a year, will lead to the development and running of an LMS for the KAIPTC.

#### d. Training & Evaluation

There have been improvements in evaluation and feedback from training courses within the period. Daily feedback from participants, generated from the Evaluation Learning Questionnaire (ELQ) 1 have been helpful in accessing views of participants about modules of courses. Feedback from ELQ 1 is high and table 8 below indicates that, out of 1442 ELQ1 administered, 1435 were received representing 99.5% receipts. Table 8 highlights the courses and the total number of ELQ1 administered/received.

#### e. Collective Training

The Centre has over the years supported the Ghana Armed Forces to conduct pre-deployment training at the BTC and Takoradi. A total of 7,385 (all ranks) were trained by the FTT team in 2013.

#### C: FACULTY OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND RESEARCH (FAAR)

The Faculty of Academic Affairs and Research (FAAR) continued to consolidate efforts towards the improvement of the quality and scope of research-led training and education on peace and security at the KAIPTC. FAAR focused on the following three key objectives in 2013:

- a. Implementation and lecture on the first two academic programmes at the KAIPTC;
- b. Undertake research into the traditional areas of peacekeeping and on UNSCR 1325, while contributing to the development and implementation of policy, academic research and discourse on new and emerging security threats in Africa including piracy and transnational organised crime and the crisis in the Sahel; and
- c. In collaboration with the Training Department, develop, pilot and facilitate training programmes at the KAIPTC.

At the beginning of the year, there was one significant restructuring to the programmatic functions of FAAR. Three programmes, namely: Conflict and Security programme (CSP), Gender, Peace and Security (GPS) and Regional Partnerships for Peace and Security (REPPS) were merged to form the Conflict, Peace and Security Programme (CPSP).

Based on the objectives set above, FAAR's main deliverables related to the four key areas were as follows:

- 1. Research and publications;
- 2. Delivery of academic programmes;
- 3. Development, piloting and facilitation of operational training courses in collaboration with the Training Department; and
- 4. Policy development and support.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF 2013 ACTIVITIES

#### a. Research and Publications

Spearheaded by FAAR, the Centre published a total of fifty-three (53) papers: ten (10) book chapters, twelve (12) journal articles, fifteen (15) policy briefs, one (1) occasional paper, seven (7) magazine articles, five (5) reports, one (1) book review, two (2) articles and one (1) newsletter article.<sup>1</sup> Six (6) course manuals and three (3) M&E reports were produced in addition to these publications.

Members of the Faculty also undertook a special two-year research project in collaboration with the University of Queensland and funded by AusAID, entitled: "Understanding and Working with Local Sources of Peace, Security and Justice in West Africa", focusing on Ghana and Liberia.

The Centre also engaged in research on piracy and transnational organised crime with a view to developing a training manual and piloting a course and on UNSCR 1325 related issues.

These publications continue to contribute to the development of policy on regional conflict, peace and security issues and international discourses on issues related to conflict, peace and security. The publications also inform the development and design of training programmes organized at the Centre.

#### b. Support to Training (Research for Training)

Led by the Faculty and in close collaboration with the Training Department, a number of courses were piloted in 2013. The modules of the courses piloted were informed by research undertaken on conflict analysis and mediation; counter piracy and transnational organised crime; sexual exploitation and abuse; and small arms and light weapons. The research highlighted the needs, the scope of various issues that needed to be addressed and the countries affected. Specific courses piloted are highlighted below:

- i. The Conflict Analysis and Mediation course was piloted in June 2013 in collaboration with the Crisis Management Initiative (CMI), Finland. Fifteen (15) African personnel were successfully trained in track 1 and 2 mediation in the pilot course.
- ii. The Counter Piracy and Transnational Organized Crimes was piloted in November 2013 in collaboration with the German Foreign Ministry. Participants were made up of 20 officers from security agencies that deal with piracy and transnational organised crime. Feedback from the course participants during the course review workshop in December 2013 indicated the course was relevant and should be continued with more focus on in-country training.

- iii. The second course piloted on Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (SEA) in Fragile, Conflict and Post-Conflict Situations was held in Bamako, Mali in November 2013. The course was funded and run by the Training for Peace (TfP) Programme. Forty-six participants from the police, gendermarie and United Nations Police (UNPoL) from Mali were successfully trained.
- iv. As a result of a needs assessment undertaken in Cote d'Ivoire and through consultations with the UN Office of the Special Representative of the Secretary General on Sexual Violence in Conflict, a CRSV training of trainers course was piloted in Cote d'Ivoire in September 2013. A total of 80 officials from national security forces, civil society and the UN Mission in Cote d'Ivoire (UNOCI) peacekeepers were trained to be trainers on Prevention and Response to (CRSV) in Cote d'Ivoire. The training was undertaken in two phases (in Grand Bassam and Bouaké) and some new trainers were selected to train officials in the second phase, under supervision.
- The annual SALW control and Border Security Management courses under the Regional V. Small Arms and Light Weapons Training Programme trained 56 practitioners in 2013. The programme is supported by the Government of Japan and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and implemented in collaboration with the ECOWAS Commission. Monitoring and evaluation of participants' work after the course showed that the countries are taking the issue of small arms seriously. For example, Cape Verde has built an arms forensic bureau to facilitate the tracing of weapons at crime scenes to their users. Additionally, some of the police officers in Praia who enrolled on the course as mid-career officers are now heading the national police operations and the police detachment at the Praia airport. Cote d'Ivoire is also embarking upon a nation-wide tracing exercise beginning with weapons in the possession of security officials. The team that does the marking is led by a former trainee of the KAIPTC SALW courses. Related to the SALW, the Sahel Project was launched as a follow-up to the successes of the Regional Small Arms and Light Weapons Training Programme. The project on 'Promoting Dialogue and Strengthening Operational Level Competencies', seeks to build emergency human capacity development needs in Nigeria, Senegal, Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger using training, research, policy dialogue and advocacy as its main tools of implementation. By December 2013, the Sahel project had supported the capacity of about 538 personnel who are at mid-high level professional ranks in their respective fields of endeavour. Five out of the six courses scheduled under the programme were developed and successfully conducted. The courses are Border Security Management, Small Arms and Light Weapons Proliferation Dynamics in the Sahel, Security Sector Governance, Collaborative Policing and Maritime Piracy and Transnational Crime. The Faculty is creatively using the Sahel Project to step up inter-programme and interdepartmental collaboration at the Centre.

- vii. In the same vein, the TfP Programme conducted two police pre-deployment MTT courses in Burkina Faso to train a 77 member Burkinabe police contingent slated for the United Nations Mission in Dafur (UNAMID) only and 126 Burkinabe police contingent for UNAMID, United Nations Stabilization Mission in Mali (MINUSMA) and United Nations Operation in Côte d'Ivoire (UNOCI). TfP also organized an orientation workshop on Peace Support Operations for Members of parliamentary select committees on defence, interior and security from five African countries in December 2013.
- viii. Led by the Faculty and with support from the Training Department, the Global Centre for the Responsibility to Protect in 2013 begun a process of developing a two-week course on the Responsibility to Protect. This course will be piloted at the KAIPTC in March 2014.

ix. The linkage between theory and practice was further strengthened in 2013. Members of FAAR facilitated modules for nine courses: Advanced Alumni Diplomacy Training; Conflict Prevention; CIMIC; DDPS; DDR; IPSO; PMMC; Protection of Civilians and SSR. FAAR staff also supported the delivery of a course on Trans-Atlantic Maritime Criminal Justice in West Africa organised at the KAIPTC by the African Center for Strategic Studies of the National Defense University (Washington DC). Staff also facilitated in APSTA's training and research colloquium held in Malawi. FAAR staff participated in internal course and external ones organized by the APSTA and the Institute for Security Studies (ISS).

#### c. Policy Engagements/International Conferences/Meetings/Programmes

Led by FAAR, the Centre continued to provide support to activities geared towards the development of policy in the following areas:

- 1. Civilian and police peacekeeping;
- 2. Peacekeeping economies;
- 3. UNSCR 1325;
- 4. The crisis in the Sahel region (including specific country consultations: Guinea Bissau and Mali);
- 5. Geo-politics and geo-economics of natural resources;
- 6. China-Africa relations and security;
- 7. Liberian history;
- 8. Human security in West Africa;
- 9. Maritime security;
- 10. Cyber security;
- 11. Elections security; and
- 12. West African security challenges.<sup>2</sup>

Members of the Faculty organized and/or participated in a total of 11 policy and course development/review workshops. This included a Policy Forum on the Inter-Linkages of Security Sector Reform and the Protection of Civilians in Africa held in August 2013 in collaboration with the Government of Australia and the UN Security Sector Reform Unit. Staff also honoured invitations from partners to 19 other policy-related engagements. There were also a further 17 requests particularly from governments for direct technical support. In general, policy development support was provided to national governments and parliaments, the UN, the AU, think tanks, academic institutions, civil society organisations and the media.

#### d. Academic Affairs

i. The Centre consolidated gains made to its academic programmes in 2013. 36 students comprising 22 females and 14 males were admitted into the Master of Arts in Gender, Peace and Security (MGPS) II and 37 students comprising nine females and 28 males were admitted into Master of Arts in Conflict, Peace and Security (MCPS III). 50 applicants comprising of 33 males and 17 females have been admitted into MCPS IV, which is scheduled to begin in January 2014.

- ii. To improve teaching and delivery of the academic programmes, teaching methods of KAIPTC lecturers, teaching assistants and course directors were enhanced through training in case study methodologies organised in collaboration with the Kennesaw State University and GIZ. MGPS II lecturers also participated in an Orientation and a Gender Concepts and Theories workshop supported by DCAF.
- iii. To prepare for the renewal of the accreditation certificates of the current academic programmes in 2014, a Curriculum Review Workshop was held to improve the standard of current courses. This workshop was supported by DCAF. A National Accreditation Board (NAB) of Ghana's review of academic curriculum, instructional materials and facilities in March 2013 concluded that the programmes were in compliance with the NAB regulations and requirements. Further assessment of institutional re-accreditation for MCPS and MGPS, as well as programme accreditation for the Postgraduate Diploma in Development Diplomacy, and the Postgraduate Certificate in Peace Support Operations were undertaken by the NAB in the last quarter of 2013.

iv. The highlight of the 2013 academic programmes was on 5 July 2013 when a Joint Graduation Ceremony was held for MCPS II and MGPS I within the commemorative ceremony for the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the KAIPTC. It marked another significant milestone in the Centre's strategic quest to provide more access to quality education at the tertiary level, in a specialised field of peace and security studies.

#### e. Other FAAR Activities

#### i. Mentorship

In 2012, the Centre's Internship Programme was expanded to include PhD Scholars from visiting universities. In 2013, the programme was renamed the Internship and External Scholars Programme and expanded to include military personnel from the United States. In 2013, the programme admitted one PhD Scholar from the Radboud University in the Netherlands, two United States military personnel from AFRICOM researching on maritime security, and five interns:– one from Nigeria, one from Germany and three from Ghana. The interns have been working on various topics relating to conflicts in Nigeria, small arms, Sahel security, alternative conflict disputes mechanisms and gender, peace and security related issues.

#### ii. Capacity Building

In February 2013, a member of the Faculty became the first serving officer of the Ghana Armed Forces to be awarded with a PhD. Five other faculty members who are being trained to lecture on the Academic Programmes continued their PhD programmes at Kennesaw State University, Cranfield University, School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS University of London) and the University of Ibadan.

Four other faculty members completed various studies and were granted Bachelors' and Masters' degrees, respectively. It is anticipated that these capacity building programmes will directly impact the output of the faculty towards the attainment of broader strategic goals of the Centre.

The Faculty's efforts in 2014 will continue to be focused on the following six key areas:

- 1. Integrated (multi-dimensional) Peace Support Operations;
- 2. ECOWAS capacity building;
- 3. UNSCR 1325 and related research;
- 4. Regional emerging security threats and West African conflict systems;
- 5. The Sahel crises; and
- 6. Expansion of KAIPTC's academic programme by adding the Certificate in Gender, Peace and Security to the two postgraduate programmes currently being offered at the Centre.

#### D: DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION

The Department continued to provide support to the Centre's core business of training, research and academic programmes. As the Centre strives to become sustainable in the coming years, the Department of Administration also directed efforts to improve internally generated funds. Related to this, a number of events were organised and coordinated by the Centre in 2013.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF 2013 ACTIVITIES

Major activities implemented by the units within the department are detailed below.

#### a. Hospitality Operations

Aiming to remain an internationally preferred Centre of Excellence in training, research and academic programmes, this unit was set up in 2013 to strategically facilitate the provision of top notch services to all stakeholders (course participants, students, visitors, staff, etc). It provided services to accommodation and conferencing, for training programmes, academic courses, business or social events. Key events supported in 2013 included the Kofi Annan-Dag Hammarskjöld Foundation inaugural lecture, Government of Ghana Ministerial and Presidential Retreats for 200 participants, Western Accord 13-Command Post Exercise, ECOWAS Chief of Defence Staff Conference, ECOWAS Regional Air Chief's Symposium, etc.

#### b. Information, Communication and Technology

The Information Communication and Technology (ICT) Unit continued to provide support to ensure the core functions of the Centre were seamlessly undertaken. The unit improved and enhanced ICT network through regular maintenance, enhanced the Centre-wide wireless internet access, replaced hardware, refurbished audio visual equipment and improved audio visual systems.

#### c. Facilities

As a result of increased number of participants and high profile visitors to the Centre, a key focus in 2013 was to upgrade and enhance the Centre's facilities. One major area of focus was to secure the Centre and ensure facilities improve health, safety and environment (HSE). Water supply was also augmented through the identification and development of an underground water system and this has reduced the cost of accessing this service from suppliers.

#### d. Human Resources

The Human Resource Unit continued to provide support and advisory services to the KAIPTC over the period. The total staff strength as at December 2013 was 331. The Breakdown of staff is illustrated in the table below.

To rationalise and optimise use of the Centre's Human Resources, a Workforce Analyses and Human Resource Audit was started in 2013 with support from GIZ. The processes will provide a basis for the development of the Strategic Human Resource/Workforce Plan and lead to the establishment of an efficient staffing structure with optimal staff size, qualifications, competencies and skills.

Specific activities undertaken include an improvement in the management of inventory using up-to-date software and an improvement in fleet management through the use of vehicle management gadget.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF KOFI ANNAN INTERNATIONAL PEACEKEEPING TRAINING CENTRE

#### Report of the financial statements

We have audited the financial statements of Kofi Annan International Peacekeeping Training Centre, which comprise the statement of financial position at 31 December 2013, the operating statement, accumulated fund and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and the notes to the financial statements which include a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2013

Significant accounting policies

1. Corporate information

Kofi Annan International Peacekeeping Training Centre is a unit of the Ghana Armed Forces. The Organisation was established by MOD promulgation on  $10^{th}$  November 1998 and was officially opened on  $24^{th}$  January 2004. It is located in Ghana with registered office address of, P.O. Box CT 210, Cantonments, Accra.

- 2. Basis of preparation
- a. Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS), and the Companies Act, 1963 (Act 179) of Ghana.

b. Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Ghana Cedi, which is the Organisation's functional currency. Except as indicated, financial information has been presented in Ghana Cedi has been rounded to the nearest Ghana Cedi.

- c. Basis of measurement
- The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis except for the following:
- Financial assets and liabilities initially are recognized at fair value.
- Investment property is initially measured at fair value.

3.1 Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, and have been applied consistently by Organisation entities.

a. Foreign currency

Foreign currency transactions and balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. At each reporting date, assets and liabilities denominated in currencies different from the functional currency are translated into the functional currency at the rate at that date. Foreign exchange gains and losses are recognized in the income statement.

#### b. Property and equipment

Property and equipment is initially recorded at cost. Cost prices include costs directly attributable to the acquisition of property and equipment as well as any subsequent expenditure when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Organisation and the expenditure can be measured reliably. All other expenditure is recognized in the income statement when incurred.

#### (iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the income statement on a straight-line basis, over the estimated useful lives of each part of property and equipment. Leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives. Land is not depreciated.
